Opening Story:

History of Valentine's Day: Provided by Dennis Deluzio, Music Director for WIHS Radio, Middletown, Connecticut.

- The word "love" appears 310 times in the King James Bible, 348 times in the New American Standard Bible, 551 times in the New International Version and 538 times in the New Revised Standard Version.
- There is no single correct way to translate the ancient Hebrew, Aramaic and Greek Bible manuscripts into English. The grammar, structure, and style of those languages are very different from English, and a literal word-for-word translation is not possible. Therefore, the number of times a particular word appears is usually different for each version of the Bible.
- Let's take a quick look at 3 Greek words for love found in the Bible.
 - 1. Phileo This love speaks of affection, fondness, or liking. But it can collapse under stress. Often defined as "brotherly love."
 - 2. Agape This love keeps on loving even when the loved one is unresponsive, unkind, unlovable, and unworthy. It is unconditional love. It is God's love.
 - 3. Eros Refers to sexual, erotic love or desire.
- On February 14 around the year 270A.D., Valentine, a holy priest in Rome in the days of Emperor Claudius II, was executed. Under the rule of Claudius the Cruel, Rome was involved in many unpopular and bloody campaigns. The emperor had to maintain a strong army, but was having a difficult time getting soldiers to join his military leagues. Claudius believed that Roman men were unwilling to join the army because of their strong attachment to their wives and families.
- To get rid of the problem, Claudius banned all marriages and engagements in Rome. Valentine, realizing the injustice of the decree, defied Claudius and continued to perform marriages for young lovers in secret. When Valentine's actions were discovered, Claudius ordered that he be put to death. Valentine was arrested and dragged before the Prefect of Rome, who condemned him to be beaten to death with clubs and to have his head cut off. The sentence was carried out on February 14, on or about the year 270. Legend also has it that while in jail, St. Valentine left a farewell note for the jailer's daughter, who had become his friend, and signed it "From Your Valentine."

Love does not delight in evil but rejoices with the truth. It always protects, always trusts, always hopes, always perseveres.

Love never fails. But where there are prophecies, they will cease; where there are tongues, they will be stilled; where there is knowledge, it will pass away. For we know in part and we prophesy in part, but when completeness comes, what is in part disappears. When I was a child, I talked like a child, I thought like a child, I reasoned like a child. When I became a man, I put the ways of childhood behind me. For now we see only a reflection as in a mirror; then we shall see face to face. Now I know in part; then I shall know fully, even as I am fully known.

And now these three remain: faith, hope and love. But the greatest of these is love.

Rick: What is love, Donna?

Donna: Hmm. That's an interesting question, Rick. I'll have to think about it for a minute ... I think love is caring more about another person than you care about yourself.

Rick: [Nodding] Wow! That's a great definition, Donna. Did you know God is love?

Donna: He is?

Rick: Yes. It says so in 1 John 4:8.

Donna: Cool! Sometimes you do things for others that you don't really want to do, but you do it anyway because you love them. Like when you go shopping with me. I know you don't like shopping, but you do it anyway – once in a while – because you love me.

Rick: Right. It's also like Jesus dying on the cross for our sins. He didn't want to be flogged so badly he couldn't be recognized. He didn't want to die an agonizing death on the cross for our sins, but he did it anyway because he loved us, and because he wanted to be obedient to His Father.

Donna: Yes. That's an amazing love.

Rick: John 3:16 says: "For God so loved the world that he gave his one and only Son, that whoever believes in him shall not perish but have eternal life."

Donna: Yes, that's true.

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Rick: Think about what it must have been like for God the Father and God the Holy Spirit to watch God the Son (Jesus) suffer and die on the cross. It must have been terrible.

Donna: Yes; and for all the angels who had to watch too. God must love us very much to have done that for us.

Rick: Yes, He does. Since God loves us so much, you know he'll take care of us. We don't have to worry when things may go wrong in life. God is in control. We can have confidence that God will take care of us.
