Donna: Why do we celebrate anniversaries?

Rick: To remember an important event.

Donna: Why did God want the Israelites to remember the Passover?

<u>Rick:</u> Because he wanted them to know and appreciate his faithfulness in rescuing them from the Egyptians.

Donna: What other examples are there of anniversaries in the Bible?

Rick: Now I'd like everyone to read their passage when I call on you, then I'll make a brief comment on each one.

- Deuteronomy 4:9. Moses is telling the Israelites to pass on what they have seen to their children.
- Malachi 3:16. God remembers those who honor and obey Him on a Scroll of Remembrance.
- 1 Corinthians 11:25. Jesus asks us to remember His sacrifice when we take communion.
- Genesis 9:16. God remembers His covenant to not bring a worldwide flood on his creation again.
- Exodus 20:8. Although we are no longer under the law, we should observe one day of the week for rest and worship.
- Leviticus 26:42. God remembers his covenant with Abraham, Isaac and Jacob.
- Nehemiah 9:16-17. Nehemiah warns the Jews of his day what happened to their forefathers when they failed to remember the miracles of God.

- Esther 9:28. Purim is a Jewish celebration commemorating the rescue of the Jewish people from Haman by the actions Queen Esther and her uncle Mordecai.
- Psalm 105:8. God remembers his covenants with his people for a thousand generations.
- Exodus 12:13-15a. The Jews celebrate Passover in remembrance of their firstborn children being saved from the Angel of Death. They eat unleavened bread for seven days to commemorate the haste with which they left their life of slavery in Egypt.
- Exodus 23:15-16. The Jews celebrated the Feast of Unleavened Bread, the Feast of Harvest, and the Feast of Ingathering.
- Leviticus 23 (not read). This chapter summarizes the festivals the Jews were to celebrate, as we've discussed: the Sabbath and Feast of Unleavened Bread, First Fruits, Feast of Weeks, Feast of Trumpets, Day of Atonement and Feast of Tabernacles.

Donna: What other anniversaries are there?

Rick: Well, what special days do we remember in the life of Jesus?

<u>Donna:</u> We remember Jesus' birth at Christmas, His death on Good Friday and His resurrection on Easter.

Rick: What other special days do we remember each year?

Donna: We remember the bounty God has provided on Thanksgiving. We also remember people's birthdays, such as President Lincoln, President Washington, and Dr. Martin Luther King, along with the birthdays of our friends and family.

Rick: Did you know that each of us has an anniversary with God?

Donna: We do?

Rick: Yes; the day we accept Jesus as our savior. At some point in our life we must acknowledge before God that we are a sinner, that we need God to forgive us of our sins, and that we accept God's free gift of forgiveness by believing that Jesus died on the cross to pay the penalty for our sins.

<u>Deuteronomy 16:5-6:</u> You must not sacrifice the Passover in any town the LORD your God gives you except in the place he will choose as a dwelling for his Name. There you must sacrifice the Passover in the evening, except in the place he will choose as a dwelling for his Name. There you must sacrifice the Passover in the evening, when the sun goes down, on the <u>anniversary</u> of your departure from Egypt.

<u>Deuteronomy 4:9:</u> Only be careful, and watch yourselves closely so that you <u>do not forget</u> the things your eyes have seen or let them slip from your heart as long as you live. Teach them to your children and to their children after them.

<u>Malachi 3:16:</u> Then those who feared the LORD talked with each other, and the LORD listened and heard. A scroll of <u>remembrance</u> was written in his presence concerning those who feared the LORD and honored his name.

1 Corinthians 11:25: In the same way, after supper he took the cup, saying, "This cup is the new covenant in my blood; do this, whenever you drink it, in *remembrance* of me.

Genesis 9:16: Whenever the rainbow appears in the clouds, I will see it and <u>remember</u> the everlasting covenant between God and all living creatures of every kind on the earth.

Exodus 20:8: *Remember* the Sabbath Day by keeping it holy.

Leviticus 26:42: I will **remember** my covenant with Jacob and my covenant with Isaac and my covenant with Abraham, and I will remember the land.

Nehemiah 9:16-17: But they, our forefathers, became arrogant and stiff-necked, and did not obey your commands. They refused to listen and *failed to remember* the miracles you performed among them. They became stiff-necked and in their rebellion appointed a leader in order to return to their slavery. But you are a forgiving God, gracious and compassionate, slow to anger and abounding in love.

Esther 9:28: These days should be <u>remembered and observed</u> <u>in every generation</u> by every family, and in every province and in every city. And these days of Purim should never cease to be celebrated by the Jews, nor should the memory of them die out among their descendants.

Psalm 105:8: *He remembers his covenant forever*, the word he commanded, for a thousand generations...

Exodus 12:13-15a: The blood will be a sign for you on the houses where you are; and when I see the blood, I will pass over you. No destructive plague will touch you when I strike Egypt.

This is a day you are to commemorate; for the generations to come you shall celebrate it as a festival to the LORD—a lasting ordinance. For seven days you are to eat bread made without yeast.

Exodus 23:15-16: *Three times a year* you are to celebrate a festival to me. Celebrate the Feast of Unleavened Bread...Celebrate the Feast of Harvest with the firstfruits of the crops you sow in your field. Celebrate the Feast of Ingathering at the end of the year, when you gather in your crops from the field.

<u>Leviticus 23:40-42:</u> On the first day you are to take choice fruit from the trees, and palm fronds, leafy branches and poplars, and rejoice before the LORD your God for seven days. <u>Celebrate this</u> <u>as a festival to the LORD for seven days each year.</u> This is to be a lasting ordinance for the generations to come; celebrate it in the seventh month. Live in booths for seven days: All native-born Israelites are to live in booths.

<u>John 1:12-13:</u> Yet to all who received him, to those who believed in his name, he gave the right to become children of God—children born not of natural descent, nor of human decision or a husband's will, but born of God.

Romans 10:9: If you declare with your mouth, "Jesus is Lord," and believe in your heart that God raised him from the dead, you will be saved.
